Personal Recollections of Jackson County Pioneer Families

Editor's note: The following is the third installment in an ongoing series of articles extracted from the old *Jackson Standard* and *Jackson Standard-Journal* newspapers written about some of the early pioneers of Jackson county

From the Jackson Standard-Journal, Dec. 19, 1894

Death of Peter McCain - a noted nanogenarian Peter McCain is dead. He breathed his last Monday December 17th at 5 AM at his home in Scioto township in this county. His funeral was held Thursday, the remains being interred at Antioch.

Mr. McCain was one of the noted characters of this county. He was born July 1st, 1804 in Jefferson county, Ohio, and was a son of Peter McCain, who was a native of Maryland. His parents removed to Scioto county when he was about eleven years of age. His father died there in 1826. Our subject left home early and came to Jackson to work at the Salt Works. Among other things, he hauled wood for the Salt Furnace of Judge William Givens who used the water from the old well still to be found near the Baler building.

Mr. McCain was married in 1824, Justice Samuel McDowell, the first Justice elected in this county after its organization and after whom McDowell's Run is named, performing the ceremony. Mrs. McCain was born May 21st, 1804 in Jefferson county, and was thus a few weeks older than her husband.

Fourteen children were born to them, all of whom grew to maturity and ten of whom survive. The dead are James, the oldest son, who was killed by a train at Springfield about three years ago; Rebecca, the wife of Rev. James Coon; Nancy, who was the second wife of the same; and Ivy, the wife of G.W. Spriggs. She died in the west about six years ago.

The living children are Ann, wife of Isaac Ammons of Michigan; Sarah, wife of Rev. William Crabtree of Pike county; Rachel, wife of John Tope of this city; Susan, wife of Charles Gray of Cass county, Missouri; Delilah, wife of John Pierce of Glenroy; William living in Mercer county; Peter and Daniel living in Scioto; Samuel living in Colorado and Benjamin who is living at the old home.

Daniel, the youngest, was fifty years old September 4th, 1894. Four of the sons were in the war. The descendants of Mr. and Mrs. McCain are very numerous. It is known that they have one hundred and eleven grandchildren. Many of them have large families and the number of great-grandchildren and great great-grandchildren is unknown. Mr. and Mrs. McCain had been married over seventy years. The family still has in its possession one of the old salt kettles of early days.

From the Jackson Standard-Journal, Dec. 19, 1915

Notes About William Rice the Emigrant and His Descendants In This County

William Rice, of Irish Welsh extraction, came to America about the year 1785, supposedly of Irish descent. He had the Irish brogue, but could neither talk nor understand the Irish language. He was from North Ireland, and was probably 18 years old when he crossed the pond for America. The vessel came in contact with a very severe storm, which lasted so long that the entire crew with passengers, were at the point of starvation when the landed in New York. He drifted with the tide of emigration westward, and stopped in Monroe county, Va, then a wild section of what now is called West Virginia.

He was a weaver by trade, but after his marriage tried the farming business. His eldest son John was born in 1791, and lived and died in Monroe county at the age of 90 years.

James, my father, was born in 1794. At the age of 26 he moved with his wife and one child (Brison about one year old), to Jackson county, landing here on the 18th day of November, 1820, and took up 160 acres, where he raised the large family, that has been well known throughout the county, while his grand children and great grand children are scattered over the country far and wide.

His brother William Rice came later to Jackson county, while his brother Robert Rice moved to, or near LaGrange, Mo. Grandfather William Rice, died in Monroe county, West Va at the age of 95 years. He was a man of strong convictions as to right and wrong, as we have learned through those that knew of him, and Prof J W Hank will gladly relate some of the circumstances and happenings in the home life of this mountaineer which he gathered while visiting in Monroe county, West Va, some years ago, that will prove the above to be true.

In the year 1820 when James Rice and party landed in Jackson county, you could count the houses in Jackson on your fingers almost. There was wild game in the woods such as deer, turkeys, wolves, and now and then a bear. Reuben Dickason and William Kessinger killed a she bear with her two cubs near where the Victory school house now stands, east of Jackson. I think this occurred in 1821. The circumstances of this and a great many other happenings of the early days I have in my journals, and have at other times submitted a part of them for publication.

James Rice was a soldier in the war of 1812; was stationed at Craney Island, Va, and for quite a number of years, drew a pension of \$12 per month, and lived to see his grand children honorably discharged from the Civil War of 1861-65.

I submit here an age record of some of the early settlers from Virginia in Jackson county, which I find in my journal. Nine, seven men and two women, running from 90 to 95 years, and eight running from 80 to 90 years old. Of the three families that came together from Monroe county, Va, in 1820, James Rice, William Kessinger, and Jacob Miller, all settled in Lick township, Jackson county, and raised large families – James Rice 11 children, 4 still living; Jacob Miller 8 children, all dead. Jacob Miller was Dutch, and quite a hunter, and it was claimed he could put a spell on a gun, so that the owner could not hit anything until the spell was removed by the bewitched hand. JFR

MEMORIAL DAY AT SALEM

The Grand Army Posts of Jackson and Wellston Remember the Soldiers Dead at Salem

Sunday May 23 was a perfect day, and while the millions followed their bent, several hundred people from Wellston, Jackson and Berlin gathered at Salem near Middleton to hold memorial services in honor of soldiers buried there.

The Jackson division started from Al Wood's office about 8:30 in carriages, wagons and motor and joined the Wellston division in the village of Berlin, where Jackson was given the place of honor. J.C.H. Cobb was in command of the Wellston division mounted on Highland Chief.

Arriving at Salem in good time the parade defiled into an old field facing the church, which is a part of the Kinnison farm. Several hundred people were already on the ground, and the meeting of old friends and prepara[ti]ons for the basket dinner engaged the attention of the majority, but S.J. Long and myself, walked up to the little church.

The original house was build of logs, but it was covered with boards in later years. Inside we found a number of iron rods holding the building intact. The seats are of the usual kind, and there is nothing out of the ordinary about the interior, except the memories that linger there for the Delays, Smiths, Kinnisons, Kirkendalls and many other old families.

But the graveyard was the more interesting spot on that day, and Long and I entered on the left side, which happens to be the older half. The first monument that I noticed was that of Dorothy Kight. She was the wife of James W. Kight, and died March 11, 1894, aged 81 years, 7 months and 27 days.

I was on the point of turning away, when Long told me that Mrs Kight was the mother of Mrs A W Long, and the grandmother of Mrs B.F. Price of Jackson, and her brothers and sisters.

Passing the large monument of Henry Camink who was born March 23, 1830 and died April 13, 1901, Long led me to the grave of Charles S Kinnison the father of Supt. J.E. Kinnison who died Dec 16, 1891, aged 76 years, 2 months and 20 days.

While reading the inscription, I noticed James G Elliott sowing some seed on a group of graves nearby, and I at once drafted him into my service for he knows Salem graveyard like a book, having dug many a grace in it. He began by pointing out two historic graves those of the first two buried at Salem.

The first person was G.W. Elliott, the infant of Dr James and Elizabeth Elliott who was born Sep. 27 1848, and died October 7, aged eleven days.

Dr. Elliott was the father of James G. Elliott now living in Jackson, and he moved west and died in Illinois. His wife died in this county Dec. 21, 1865. Aged 59 years 10 months and 28 days, and her remains lie buried at Salem.

The second person buried at Salem was Frances A. the wife of Lanson Smith who died Aug 17, 1844 aged 34 years, and 6 months. She was the mother of Mrs William J Kirkendall. Her husband survived until June 30 1880 dying aged 75 years.

Elliott then led me to the Delay lot and pointed out the grave of Rev Jacob DeLay, who was one of the first resident ministers in the county.

He died Oct 13, 1845 aged 65 years 9 months and 27 days. His wife Mary who lies by his side died Dec. 24, 1854 aged about 72 years.

They were the founders of the Delay family in this county, and Frank DeLay the Jackson attorney is one of their great grandsons. Rev. DeLay was chiefly instrumental in establishing Salem church and several of his sons became ministers.

Elliott also pointed out the grave of Charles Kinnison the founder of the family of that name in this county. He was born June 14, 1780, and died July 8, 1853 aged 73 years 5 months and 24 days.

Several hundred persons have been buried in this county church yard, and I did not have time to visit any others except those of veterans. Tombstones tell the brief stories of the majority of the veterans, and Elliott, B.F. Kisor and one or two others helped me to prepared the following roster, which is not quite complete. The figures after each name indicate the age at death.

DECORATION OF THE GRAVES

After the basket dinner came the march to the graveyard, the impressive ceremony of the Grand Army of the Republic and the decoration of the graves. J W Hank led in the singing. The firing squad did their work well.

THE MEMORIAL SERVICE

Commander W H Brunton of the Francis Smith Post presided and J W Hank led in the singing. Rev A.W. Long offered the prayer. D W Williams delivered a short address, after which J W Hank and S.J. Long sang a duet. Mabel Eubanks granddaughter of John D. Eubanks and Andrew McMillen then recited very admirably.

Hon A E Jacobs not being present George Woodrow of Wellston was drafted and spoke entertainingly, concluding with a song "Slavery Days".

W B Cherrington then offered a set of resolutions dealing with the erection of a monument to Wirz. He said among other things that Thomas Evans of Vega died at Andersonville and that David Greenwood of Wellston can tell a horrible story about the cruelty of Wirz. The resolutions were adopted as read, and the exercises were closed.

Among those present from a distance were Commissioner and Mrs R D Thomas of Camba who lived in the Salem neighborhood for many years, Mr and Mrs Cyrus Jenkins of Vega and John Davis of Carmel.

[The Anti-Wirz resolutions followed, but are not printed here for lack of space.]



In Memory of Mary Overly Anders

Mary Overly was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, April 16, 1833, died at her son Louis Anders (home) a few miles west of Jackson Dec. 21, 1910 aged 77 years 8 months and 6 days. When 8 years old with her parents she came to Jackson county Ohio, locating in Liberty township, where she spent most of her life.

She was one of a large family of 9 children born to Adam and Margaret Overly, 3 girls and 6 boys only two of which, Samuel and William, both aged living near Jackson, survive her. April 1st, 1886 she was married to James Anders. To them were born 3 children, two sons and one daughter.

The daughter died some years ago leaving the sons Lewis and John Andres to mourn the loss of a true Christian mother. There are also five grandchildren. Clyde E. Anders, deceased, Ralph L Anders, Floyd E Anders, Grace L Anders, and Jessie Patterson.

She united with the Christian Union Church at Pleasant Grove 35 years ago with a large class, most of which have preceded her to the other shore to await her coming home. Last year she untied with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Pleasant Grove, saying she wished to hold her membership there where so many precious memories cluster.

August 22nd, 1909, her husband died and then she frequently expressed herself as so lonely without Pa and a desire to go to him. She was a true wife in every sense a helpmate lightening her husband's burden, when possible and always cheering him in life's struggles. She was a consecrated mother keeping her life on the altar of her children's comfort.

<u>Mrs John Rose Drowned in Returning from the</u> <u>Souders Funeral</u> - Her Young Grand Daughter Accompanying Her Lost Her Life at the Same Time

A tragedy which occurred near Peniel church on Dirty Face in Gallia county, has shocked the entire population of Greenfield township. Mrs. John Rose and her little grand daughter, the daughter of Mrs. William Gilliland were both drowned in the swollen waters of Dirty Face while returning to their home after attending the funeral of Mr. Robert Souders, brother of John Souders, at Gallia.

The bodies were carried by the waters and that of Mrs. Rose was found on the farm of Rev. William R Evans, while that of the child was found on the Shelton farm. Mrs. Rose was the mother of Mrs. James Armstrong of Madison and of Mrs Evan Edwards who died of fever in this city two years ago. The grand daughter, who was six years old, was the great grand daughter of Mrs. John Phillips of Oak Hill.


