## OBITUARY

William Littlejohn, son of Foster and Margaret Littlejohn, was born in Lawrence county, Ohio, June 12, 1833, and departed this life February 15, 1922, aged 88 years, 3 months and 8 days.

He came from a family of 5 children, 4 boys and 1 girl, all of whom have preceded him to the spirit land, except one brother, George, who resides in the State of Florida.

His early life was spent at the old charcoal iron furnaces in the vicinity of South Webster, Ohio. He later located at South Webster, where in the year 1860 he was united in marriage to Miss Eliza DeBow. To this union were born eight children, four of whom and their mother having preceeded him in death.

After a period of time, during the year 1877, he was again united in marriage to Mrs. Mary Thompson, of Latrobe Furnace, Jackson county, Ohio, to which union were born 4 children.

When the Civil War broke out, on August 10, 1862, he enlisted in the service of his country as a private in Co. G, 27th Regiment, O. V. I., remaining in the same until the close of the war, when he returned to South Webster, where he remained for a number of years. Leaving there, he went to the Hocking Valley, and from there back to Latrobe Furnace, Jackson county.

In 1896, he moved to Hamden, Ohio, where he resided for 28 years, or until his death. Here he moved out of the tenement of clay and crossed the swelling tide to meet his Lord and Savior.

He was a charter member of Wellston Lodge, Knights of Pythias, remaining an honored and worthy member until his death.

In 1881, he united with the Baptist Church, remaining a member of the same until about 18 years ago, when his membership was transferred to the United Brethren Church of Hamden, remaining a member until Death called him to become a member of the church triumphant.

He was a good citizen and neighbor, a kind and loving father, and a tender and affectionate companion.

He leaves to mourn their loss a kind and loving wife, one brother, four sons and four daughters, besides twelve grandchildren and one great-grandchild: Ira Littlejohn, of Lewiston, Mont.; Charles, of Columbus, Ohio; Mrs. Chas. Hudson, of Dayton, Ohio; Mrs. Wilbur Newell, of South Webster, Ohio; William and Wells, of Loveland, Ohio; Mrs. Wm. Quinlisk, of Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. Frank Landis, of Nelsonville, Ohio, besides a host of other relatives and friends.

Funeral services, conducted by Rev. J. W. Belcher, were held from the U. B. Church Saturday morning at 10 A.M. Burial followed.

Dear Eleanor,

Will you please present this at the September meeting and let me know the results?

I have, on microfilm, Jackson County Postmaster Appointments from 1832-1971. I will estimate this record contains over 300 names, since there have been about 70 post offices in Jackson County. This record also indicates when most post offices were established and discontinued.

I have offered to provide this information in "installments" for Poplar Row. If the Chapter is interested in printing the Postmasters, I need to know how much space I can have in each issue of Poplar Row and deadlines for my submissions. Early darkness will soon end my after work visits to the library, so it may be after the first of the year before I can start submitting.

The information is from copies of the original ledgers maintained for the Postmaster General of the United States. The old records microfilmed very well, but sometimes I find a name or date that has faded out.

I have seen much erroneous information printed about Jackson County post offices; therefore, I must insist that the installments be printed as are copied, with no edit or additions. I can see Poplar Row to combine other information with of course data; thereby making it impossible for reader to know what is from actual records.

If someone has a comment or additional information, it should be added after my installment or elsewhere in the newsletter with the source and the submitter clearly identified, so it will not be taken as part of the official records.

It has been suggested that I submit the Postmaster listings by townships. This is impossible at present, and may never be possible, because I have been told there are no official records for the locations of early post offices. I understand that the records prior to 1824 do not indicate the county the post office was in.

I am working on post office locations. It could be months or years before I am satisfied that I have all available. Copies of old documents and microfilm are rather expensive. This slows down my research. I would have to purchase at least another \$136.00 worth of microfilm to do a good research job. Therefore, at this time, I am not attempting to write a complete history of Jackson County Post Offices.

I had thought about trying to use census records to determine Post Office locations, but that can be misleading since many patrons crossed townships and county lines for mail.

My intent, so far as the Postmaster appointments are concerned, is to put names and dates in Poplar Row. I will give the post office name, of course.

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I have seen a copy of a book or brochure printed in 1973 to commemorate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Jackson post office. That book contains numerous errors. At present, I have copies of old documents that give locations for four Jackson County post offices. Two of the four are listed in the wrong townships in that 1973 book. Jordan Post Office is listed in that book as located "in southern Liberty Township". I have a copy of the application for the proposed office of Jordan, which was established 24 March 1888 in the Northeast Quarter of Section 23, Milton Township. The name "Detroit" has been crossed off and the name "Jordan" added. Under the name, in rather large letters, is printed "Select a short name for the proposed office, which, when written, will not resemble the name of any other post office in the state". The application also gives the name of J. J. Edwards as the contractor who was carrying mail on the route nearest to the location of Jordan.

I have also found that Oak Hill was not the second Jackson County Post Office, as stated in the 1900 history by Williams. And, Oak Hill was not the third Jackson County Post Office as stated in the 1973 book mentioned above. By 1832 there were three Post Offices in the County; Jackson, Poor's and Reed's Mills. The next post offices: Dawkins Mills 2 March 1833, Riley 8 August 1833, Menager 27 October 1836 and Oak Hill 11 March 1837. If there were more than three post offices prior to 1832, some must have been discontinued prior to then. I do know that three of the above post offices were in the northern part of the county. I find that my Gr Gr Gr Uncle Jesse Savage was one of the sureties for the bond for the first postmaster at Dawkins Mills, which was probably the first post

office in Melton Township. Uncle Jesse had the first deed to the farm my Grandfather Braley was born on, and lived on for the first 80 of his almost 96 years.

In addition to finding Uncle Jesse Savage in the Postmaster records, I've also found a Great Grandfather, a Gr Gr Grandfather, the husband of a Gr Gr Aunt, the brother of a Great Grandmother, and a several others I'm almost sure are related in some way to my family.

I have spent a lot of time and money on this project. If the Chapter does not want to print the postmaster appointments, I would like to know as soon as possible. If the postmaster information is wanted for Poplar Row, I need to know how much space I can have in each issue (minimum and maximum) and deadlines for my submittals. I started this project so I could contribute something for the newsletter, but if it is not wanted for that purpose, I have other ideas for the information. I would appreciate an answer one way or the other.

Arvilla Brant, granddaughter of William Littlejohn, thought perhaps William's obituary would be a nice addition to the files of a genealogical society. I am sending you a copy since William lived in Jackson County at one time. Arvilla called attention to the fact that the newspaper is dated 1921 while the obituary gives the year of his death as 1922. Arvilla said family records have always shown his death date as 1922. She thinks the date on the newspaper is in error. Byer news in the same newspaper tells of funeral for William Morrey. Byer Cemetery records indicate Warren W. Morrey died in 1922.

You seem to have some erroneous information in your cross reference files. Mrs. John L. Ferguson was advised that Enoch was father of David Mc Neal who d. 15 Aug 1884 and who married Anna Miller. Family records indicate David's father was Absolem. This is confirmed by death record for David. See Assessor Records for Bloomfield Twp., which gives David's parents as Abe Mc Neal and Comfort Smith. David's age on death record seems to be wrong. Other records tend to indicate David was about 80 when he died. Absolem Mc Neal married Comfort Smith.
