Word has reached this city of the death of Mrs. Mary Elizabeth McCormick, wife of T. W. McCormick of Fairfield, Green Township, Gallia County, September 2. Mrs. McCormick died in Holzer Hospital, at Gallipolis, where she had been taking treatment for anemia for four months.

Mrs. McCormick was a daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. J. J. C. Evans of Jackson. She is survived by her husband, a son, John Halliday Mc-Cormick, a senior at West Point, two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Williams of Toledo and Mrs. Jane Phillips of Columbus, and a brother, Benson Evans, at Gilmore, Idaho.

Mrs. McCormick was a member of Fairfield Methodist church, where the funeral was held last Thursday morning by Rev. C. S. Thompson of Rodney and Rev. Curtis Smith of Gallipolis.
