

RENIGER FUNERAL HELD WEDNESDAY

Remains of Former Jackson Countian Are Brought Here for Burial

Funeral services were held last Wednesday afternoon at the home of Charles Dungan in this city for Geo. Reniger who passed away in Myra, W. Va., December 23. Rev. W. C. Millikan officiated.

Mr. Reniger resided at Camba until a few months ago, when he sold his property there. He and his wife left a month ago for Myra, W. Va., where they have been living at the home of their granddaughter, Mrs. Hal Black.

Death came entirely unexpected. Mr. Reniger had been subject to attacks of heart trouble, and had not been feeling well for a few days. On Saturday night he was in good spirits and joked with the family before retiring, at about 10:30. The next morning at 5:30 Mr. Reniger became seriously ill, and died before Mrs. Reniger could summon help.

The deceased had resided at Camba for thirty years and during all that time he was postmaster and proprietor of the general store. He was a former county commissioner and county auditor. Mr. Reniger was also prominent in county fraternal orders.

Besides the widow, one son, Joseph Reniger of Columbus, and one sister, Mrs. Emma Seth, of Parkersville, survive. Mrs. Seth is more than 70 years of age, and was unable on account of ill health and age to attend the funeral. A grandson, Lyle Dyer, now located in Myra, made his home with his grandparents at Camba for a number of years.

Pilgrim Holiness Congregation Raise \$1800 at Sunday Service.
