COUNCIL ACTS ON WATER ORDINANCE

Salaries of Light Plant Employees Fixed.


At the council meeting on March 24th a water ordinance was adopted fixing the rate at 50 cents per thousand and gallons in quantities less than 5000 gallons and the fire plug rate at \$60 per hydrant for 86 plugs. This is lower than the present rate which is 65 cents per thousand gallons and \$85 per hydrant. This rate has not been accepted by the water company.

The salaries of the employees at the light plant was also voted on at this meeting. Three engineers are to be employed for \$360 a month. The superintendent's salary will be \$150 per month, an assistant at \$100 and the fireman will receive \$85 per month. Fred Lambert will remain as superintendent.
