OAK HILL WOMAN DIES AT 75 YEARS

Mrs. Bettie Stemshorn Passes Away Mon-

Mrs. Bettie Stemshorn passed away at her home in Oak Hill Monday evening after an illness lasting a little over two weeks. Death was caused by heart trouble and complications.

About two years ago she suffered a severe attack of influenza, from which she never fully recovered. Her trouble was further aggravated by a fall which she received on January 13 of this year. About two weeks ago she contracted a severe cold, but later seemed to be on the road to recovery when she suffered a relapse, from which she failed to rally.

Mrs. Stemshorn was the oldest daughter of John and Ethel Schrader and was born in Baden, Germany, July 3, 1849. At the time of her death she was 75 years of age.

She was united in marriage to Henry Stemshorn, and to this union were born four sons and one daughter, namely: Fred, Will, Charles, Frank, and Emma. All are living except Charles, who was killed by a train in Ironton in 1912.

Surviving are three sons, Will, and Frank, of Oak Hill, and one daughter, Mrs. Emma Comer of Oak Hill; four sisters, Mrs. Emma Geisel of Columbus, Mrs. Kate Leach of Lorain, Mrs. Susie Hall, Martins-ville, Ind., Miss Rose Schrader, Kings Mills, and one brother John Schrader of Oak Hill.

Funeral was held at the M. E. Church in Oak Hill Thursday morning, with interment in the C. M.

cemetery.
